For the sake of time, you may want to choose one or two questions.

Week 1 - Introduction

Warm Up:

Have you ever read any portion of the Book of Leviticus before? What were your impressions?



Discuss:

1. The Book of Leviticus is an ancient document, approximately 2,500 years old. Why is it important to keep this fact in mind when reading the book? What things were different in the ancient world compared to the world of today?
2. How does the Book of Leviticus function in the context of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament)? What is its specific purpose? Do you remember the purpose of the other four books of the Pentateuch (Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Deuteronomy)?
3. What do we mean when we say that Leviticus is "sacred scripture"? What is implied by this term? What makes "sacred scripture" different from other ancient writings?
4. What is the biggest question you have about the Book of Leviticus as we begin this study? What do you hope to learn as we work through this book?
